UNZHA (Kostroma)

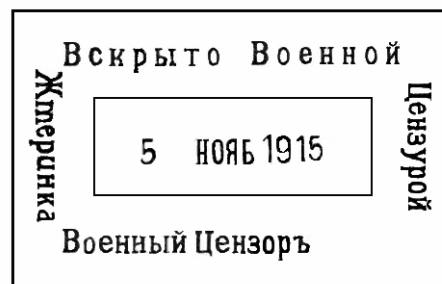
Up to now no censor marks from the Kostroma

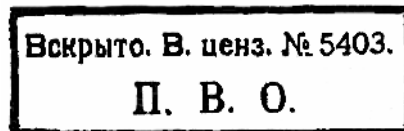


IV. Military Districts

Most of the marks listed originally here have
been located now and figure under the town
names. Exceptions however are the P.V.O.-
marks of the 5000 series – see type 1 of the
Petrograd Military District; the area where they
were used is still uncertain.

gether with a linear datemark and addressed to
KATERINEN – now Kadrina – Estonia, 20 May
1917.
